 - 5. Chapters must still provide mandatory items even though the committee will verify with IHQ

All submissions must follow the International Graduate Chapter of The Year Evaluation Criteria listed below without deviation and in criteria order. Forms must not be altered / changed or deductions will take place. For example, the yearbook starts with:

- a) Introduction and Presentation
- b) Table of Contents
- c) Proper Labeling

(The yearbook must follow that order without deviation).

- c) Conclave / Leadership conference delegates




CHARTER MEMBERS

There were nine charter members: Brothers Orlando Bell, Charles Brown, Alphonso Cooper, William T. Lewis, Darryl Madison, Charles Peevy, Lewis Ritcherson, Jerry E. Smith, Jr., and Rev. James C. Wright. Brothers Bell, Wright, Peevy, Ritcherson and Madison are now in OMEGA Chapter.

Since its inception 37 years ago, the chapter has maintained a strong commitment to scholarship. We have had minority scholarship and/or book award recipients for all the years we've existed. Gamma Gamma Gamma also recognizes community service as an essential function of Omega Psi Phi.

In 1994, the chapter undertook a revolutionary idea and implemented it. In that year the 501c(3) Carter G. Woodson Scholarship & Community Service Foundation, Inc. was founded. Today the Woodson Foundation handles virtually all the service efforts of the chapter. Bro. Anthony Wade served as the first president of the foundation. The foundation has an aggressive fundraising campaign and has remained financially sound.

Therefore, the chapter has been actively involved in uplifting the Madison community. The chapter had continued the Thanksgiving Food Drive to feed needy families and individuals for 12 years before the Woodson Foundation took it over for the last 15 years. The Woodson Foundation continues to drive many of the Chapter's initiatives, taking on two new grants this year totaling over \$70,000 to combat COVID-19 and uplift young, black, middle and high school students.



GGG AT A GLANCE

Gamma Gamma has received many accolades and commendations over the years. Historically, the Chapter received certificates from the 10th District Reclamation Committee, Assault on Illiteracy Committee, and Voter Registration Education and Mobilization at the District Level. 


ACHIEVEMENT WEEK

She desires to major in Criminal Justice with a minor in African American Studies so that she can help return the criminal justice to its intended purposes and help underprivileged people who fall victim to the biases within the justice system by raising awareness of the mistreatment, educating the community, serving as a role model and inspiring youth to make positive change. Believing that racism in the criminal justice system is a pressing matter that we cannot ignore, she intends to help eliminate the impurities that lie deep within our criminal justice system and encourage others to do the same.

Therefore, the Carter G. Woodson Foundation is honored to award our first scholarship to a young who is in passionate pursuit of justice for others, **Miss Adeja Shannon**.

Our next recipient is concerned with the health care received by Hmong patients in a system not intended to meet the myriad of needs of those of us who are Hmong and comprehend little to no English. She desires to bridge the gap between the Hmong community and healthcare providers.

When she attended doctor appointments with her grandparents she was struck by the inability of doctors, nurses and other healthcare providers to effectively communicate with her grandparents and they would often leave those appointments not understanding any of the information relative to their diagnosis, treatment, medications, etc. Therefore, they are often left lacking important knowledge of their medical status which can have negative consequences.

Believing that the presence of a Hmong nurse could help Hmong patients by easing their uncertainty about their treatment and creating a comfortable space to ask and understand their health issues and concerns, she intends to major in nursing and serve as that Hmong nurse that her community so desperately needs.

The Carter G. Woodson Foundation is therefore honored to award our second scholarship to our next great healthcare provider who will open the doors of access to the Hmong community, **Miss Kareena Thao.**

The Rev. James C. Wright was a native of Camden, South Carolina where he graduated from Mather Academy. His teachers at Mather were role models who "dared to make a difference." They fought against and resisted every vestige of segregation and discrimination. And it was that attitude and obligation that Rev. Wright adopted and that helped to shape the remainder of his life's work. Recognizing the importance of education, Rev. Wright left home to study philosophy at Virginia Union University where he became involved in the Virginia civil and human rights movement. After completing his pre-theological training at Union, he studied philosophy and theology at Payne A.M.E. Theological Seminary and Wilberforce University and psychology at the University of Wisconsin Madison.

His work in Madison speaks for itself, but it also reflects the reality that the Rev. James C. Wright was a "drum major for justice" and a change agent who believed that his presence in the world was intended to help shape and change the world. Thus, the Rev. James C. Wright Scholarship is awarded to young men who desire to make a difference in the world and whose desire for further education is intended to enhance their ability impact the communities and world that they live in. And today, we have come to recognize a young man whose life, ambitions, and hopes mirror those of Rev. Wright and make him the perfect recipient of this year's Rev. James C. Wright Scholarship.





Gamma Gamma's 501c3 affiliate, the Carter G. Woodson Scholarship and Community Service Foundation received an incredible boost to help propel the Chapter's Social Action initiatives forward. Woodson Foundation President, Bro. Arlington Davis, III and Secretary, Bro. Richard Jones, Sr. worked to obtain a \$35,000 grant from Madison Metropolitan School District to mentor Black, male, middle and high school students on Madison's Northside. Bro. Tim Hall, the "Life as a Boy" coordinator at Vera Court Neighborhood Center, helped secure a location to host mentoring sessions. Cultural Enrichment Director Bro. Rodney Saunders, Jr. helped spearhead the Black Excellence Mentoring Program as Chair, and Bro. Langston Evans has taken over as the Vice Chair and curriculum planner.

Truly a Chapter-led initiative, Brothers welcomed the students to the program virtually in Spring 2021 and began rolling out lessons rotating around the Fraternity's cardinal principles. As CDC guidelines allowed mentors to interact in-person, which immediately proved more effective, boys learned about Carter G. Woodson, Col. Charles Young, Juneteenth, their rights and responsibilities when interacting with police, and much, much, more. Mentees not only gain education not often taught in school, they have fun on field trips, the Chapter routinely provides them with meals, and they even received back to school haircuts as part of a lesson on entrepreneurship. The Chapter plans to renew the grant annually and continue to mentor students through graduation.

Gamma Gamma Gamma Chapter did not let the pandemic hold them back from voting or getting the word out, or assisting others. On the contrary, the Chapter coordinated volunteers to work together at a single polling place – Mt. Olive Lutheran Church. Brothers rotated shifts throughout the entire day, from the first ballot to the last. Some Brothers stayed for more than one shift and those worked in the evening stayed behind to ensure ballots were counted correctly and accurately. 

COVID GRANT

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) issued a grant program aimed at promoting racial and geographic equity in the COVID-19 vaccination program. DHS awarded approximately 50 grants to community-based organizations engaged in health equity work that complemented Wisconsin's efforts to promote vaccine confidence and minimize systemic barriers. In addition to the Mentoring Grant from Madison Metropolitan School District, the Woodson Foundation 501c3 obtained this grant from DHS in the amount of \$35,000.

Led by Bros. Anthony Wade and Wesley Harden, the Chapter used this grant to work with local news and radio stations spreading the message to stop the spread of Covid 19. The Chapter reached out to local homeless shelters, such as the Beacon Day Center and provided those guests and others in need with bus passes. Bros. Wade and Harden also collaborated with the Black Excellence Mentoring Program students at the Vera Court Neighborhood Center, interactively educating them on how the COVID-19 vaccine works against the virus. Following the success of the grant, the Chapter intends to apply for a renewal this year.



In response to the rise in public concerns regarding the safety of COVID-19 vaccines, Bro. Frederic "Ric" Ransom, Regional Vice President of UW Hospitals in Madison, WI teamed up with the ladies of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. to educate the public on COVID-19 awareness, health and safety protocols, effectiveness of masks, vaccine information (e.g., delivery methods, how it works, that it does not alter ones DNA, questions/concerns about pregnant women, etc.) and encouragement, especially for communities of color. 




JOB WELL DONE





Madison on Election Day: Youth mentor Timothy Hall

Timothy Hall was awakened the morning of Election Day by a flurry of text messages telling him to get up and vote.

"It's been exciting!" Hall said. "You wake up and everyone's super excited about the day. Everyone is like 'Go! Go! Go!' I had like a hundred texts in five minutes about going to vote to make sure I went out to vote."

Hall, who runs the "Life as a Boy" youth program at the Vera Court Neighborhood Center on Madison's north side, said that this particular election is different than others he's experienced.

"Just all around you can see the excitement downtown. We took the kids downtown so they could see how the election is going," Hall said. "It's pretty crazy downtown. The kids got a chance to take a picture with Uncle Sam. There's a guy standing on stilts downtown dressed up as Uncle Sam!"

Hall said people were up and moving and excited to be taking part in what is potentially the most landmark election in modern times. But as someone who mentors kids, Hall was also perceptive about how those who are too young to vote are spending the day.

Black political leaders host online forum to encourage, prepare Black candidates to run for political office

"It is no secret that we need determined leaders to take the will and to create real change here in this city," said State Rep. Shelia Stubbs, the first African-American to represent Madison and Dane County in the Wisconsin Assembly. "If we're going to be dedicated to ending the public health crisis of racism, we need people of color to hold elected positions."

Stubbs was one of several African-American politicians offering advice and inspiration on Nov. 27 as Blacks for Political and Social Action of Dane County (BPSADC) hosted an online training forum titled "Preparing Black Candidates for Political Office." With the registration deadline for Dane County's 2021 spring elections quickly approaching, this BPSADC forum was looking to encourage and educate Dane country residents interested in running for public office.

The event was moderated by Pastor David Hart, president of the BPSADC, and featured a panel of five local political leaders: State Rep. Stubbs; Ray Allen, a former Madison School Board member and Madison mayoral candidate; former Madison School Board President James Howard; Madison Common Council President Alder Sheri Carter; and Kaleem Caire, a recent Madison School Board candidate.

'Let's Talk About It': Book preserves, celebrates Madison's Black Lives Matter murals

This Is A Revolution. Justice 4Everyone.

Those words were painted on boarded up windows at 227 State St. early last summer and were part of a blocks-long impromptu art gallery that sought to both beautify a stretch of plywood boards and give voice to those protesting against the police killing of Black people.

The messages captured a moment in time.

The protests that took over downtown Madison streets throughout the summer led to business owners boarding up their storefronts after windows were broken. Those boards, in turn, became canvases carrying messages of anguish and pride from people of color.

At a time when many of the street's retail stores and restaurants were closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, damage suffered during the protests or both, the artwork brought people to the street.

But as the intensity of the protests subsided and the boards started to come down, many grew concerned that the messages of the murals would be lost. Preserving the works of art and their messages became a priority for Dane County Judge Everett Mitchell.




Langston Evans honored with College Station's 2021 College Access Champion Award

Hart started as special assistant to the superintendent at Madison Metropolitan School District in the last month and said there are three facets to the position: policy, community engagement and special issues, particularly surrounding restorative justice.

And although he enjoyed his previous position as a prosecutor in the Dane County District Attorney's Office, he believed in Jenkins' vision.

"I really did enjoy the work that I was doing with District Attorney (Ismael) Ozanne," Hart told Madison365. "I was doing really important work and really meaningful work — I was prosecuting domestic violence cases and hate crimes. But I chose to accept this role because I believe in Dr. Jenkins's vision. It's a clear vision, it's an innovative one, it's audacious and it's something that this community needs and it's long overdue."

Jordan, who is also academic advisor for UW University School of Education, submitted A New Song along with another piece, Ray of Light, for evaluation back in January. By mid-February, A New Song was chosen out of the two to be presented at the exhibition.

"I just wanted to kind of put us, put African Americans in a painting that is not about a struggle because not everything in life is a struggle and [that] sometimes we can be presented in a non-struggle," Jordan continued.

As a young man, Dr. Marvin A. Pryor envisioned his life as a professional jazz musician touring the nation opening for acts such as Ray Charles, Cameo and The Ohio Players.

Pryor accomplished that dream and since then has been helping students and educators realize theirs.

He is the author of three nonfiction books, is the trombonist in a nationally touring jazz band The PR Experience, and has 30 years of educational experience.

In 2020 he moved to Madison to be one of the district's chiefs of secondary education. But just seven months into his position, Madison Metropolitan School District announced that he will be promoted to the chief academic officer.

In coordination with superintendent Dr. Carlton Jenkins, Pryor will help set the framework for what instruction is going to look like in the 52 MMSD schools that serve some 27,000 students. He will focus on alignment between departments in how they support schools, as well as ensuring student success through graduation, college and community readiness, Pryor said.



Anderson and Leavy win seats on Beloit school board

Incumbent Spencer Anderson and newcomer Sean Leavy won the two open seats on the Beloit school board while newcomers Christine Raleigh and Gregg Schneider didn't make it.



Teachers worry legislation limiting race discussion could have 'chilling' effect in Wisconsin classroom


Six months ago, Percy Brown Jr. sat in front of a virtual background depicting basketball greats Kobe Bryant and Michael Jordan to talk about combatting racism through activism.

As his young child, babbling and cooing, popped in and out of the frame, Brown led an online discussion about research and civic engagement for a seventh-grade literacy and social studies class at the behest of a teacher at Middleton's Kromrey Middle School. During the nearly 40-minute discussion he highlighted his family's history and involvement in the Mississippi Civil Rights Movement, and answered questions about what activism means to him, as both an educator and as a father of a young biracial child.

"We will need young folks to start learning about these things now so that as you start entering the workforce or enter your adult lives you'll be informed and educated and ready to take on these fights," he said during the presentation.

Months later Brown, the director of diversity and student engagement at the Middleton-Cross Plains School District, found himself in the middle of the latest controversy over how teachers help students think about race. Last month, the conservative Wisconsin Institute for Law and Liberty singled out Brown's presentation in a report that called for legislation ordering schools to publicly post all their teaching material after a parent complained that Brown had promoted "violent revolution" during the discussion.

UW-Madison's Burt earns Wickenden Award from American Society for Engineering Education

Urban League of Greater Madison receives \$400K grant for prospective Black Business Hub tenants

Prospective occupants of a planned business hub for minority-owned businesses on Madison's South Side could get help to sustain and scale up their operations from the hub's capital fund — a fund that itself scaled up with state support Friday.

The Urban League of Greater Madison is receiving a \$400,000 grant from the Wisconsin Economic Development Corp. for a fund that will provide loans, grants and technical assistance to startups and existing businesses considering moving into the South Madison Black Business Hub.

"The purpose of the hub will create a space to grow and nurture Black and other businesses," Urban League president and CEO Ruben Anthony said at a news conference Friday. "It's critical when you have a hub coming up to have an accelerator and grant and loan program."

The fund — dubbed the Black Business Hub Accelerator Fund — has commitments totaling nearly \$1.5 million now, Anthony said. It's anticipated to help at least 40 business owners gain access to financial capital, which Anthony said is one of the major challenges Black-owned businesses face.



Couple devoted to making Madison a better place where all can flourish

Madison's new superintendent faces steep challenge as he tackles the 'two pandemics'

Madison School District Superintendent Carlton Jenkins returned to Madison amid what he calls two pandemics: COVID-19 and racism.

His tenure as superintendent in Madison began a little more than a year ago heading into what would become a full school year disrupted by the coronavirus as he oversaw a shift from fully online learning to a hybrid that mixed in part-time in-person learning for many students.

In that first year, he also experienced the fallout from two hidden camera scandals at East High School that carried over from the previous administration, conflict with the local teachers union over contracts, and significant turnover in the administrative office as he sought to shift the district's standing from "good to great."

Through it all, Madison's first Black superintendent told the Wisconsin State Journal in a sit-down interview he remains steadfast in his goal: to make the district a prototype for the rest of the nation to follow in an effort to eliminate disparities in educational outcomes between students of color and their white counterparts.

Sherman Middle School unveils two new equity-focused murals


Sherman Middle School staff unveiled two new murals focused on equity, created by the Dane Arts Mural Arts (DAMA).

A judge challenged a man in his court to a game of chess, and helped change a life in the process

Green, 52, has also been involved in the criminal justice system in one way or another for a lot of his life, and played a lot of chess while incarcerated. About two years ago, he found himself in front of Judge Everett Mitchell in Dane County's high-risk drug court, a program of the criminal justice system targeting people who have committed non-violent, drug-related crimes. People who complete the drug court program and stay sober can have their sentences reduced or even have charges dismissed.

Mitchell says he tries to approach people in his court as individuals, rather than numbers in a system. He says he doesn't even use the word "defendant" in drug court, making a point to refer to people by their names.

"I try to find something that each person has a unique thing about, whether it is their art or their children, or chess, or reading books, or putting together puzzles," Mitchell says. "You find something and you build on that strength, because you want them to know that they're not invisible. And even though they're adults, they're still capable of change."

For Green, that unique thing was chess.
